Love Your Enemies

Aim High!



"So be perfect, just as your heavenly Father is perfect." Talk about a high bar! This verse, at the end of today's Gospel passage from Matthew, sets the tone for all the readings this week. In embracing stewardship as a way of life, we have a custom-made plan that, with a big dose of God's grace, will move us towards the holiness of life to

which Christ is calling us in this verse.

Our first reading, from Leviticus, lays out this theme immediately, as God instructs Moses to tell the whole community to, "Be holy, for I, the Lord, your God, am holy." The call to holiness is for everyone because every one of us is made in the image and likeness of an all-holy God. This call should therefore not seem strange or unattainable — on the contrary, it is a call to become our truest selves. And even in this ancient passage, we find practical instruction in how to begin to attain holiness: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. I am the Lord."

The first few verses of our second reading from Corinthians give a further reminder as to why we must live holy lives with this thought-provoking question, "Do you not know that you are the temple of God, and that the Spirit of God dwells in you?" What great dignity we have as God's own dwelling place. And what encouragement this should bring us — the call to holiness is possible because we have the Holy Spirit dwelling right within us! The following verses from this passage show us that a life of holiness will not make sense in worldly terms, however. "If any one among you considers himself wise in this age, let him become a fool, so as to become wise. For the wisdom of this world is foolishness in the eyes of God." The stewardship way of life, giving away the best of our time, our talents, and our treasure to God for His glory and for the sake of others, is the path to holiness. Yet, it appears utterly foolish in the eyes of many.

In our Gospel passage from Matthew, our Lord takes this "foolish" concept even further with these illustrations of how we should give of ourselves and our things: "When someone strikes you on your right cheek, turn the other one as well. If anyone wants to go to law with you over your tunic, hand over your cloak as well. Should anyone press you into service for one mile, go for two miles." And further still: "love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you." Jesus teaches that this is the kind of action and attitude that will make us "children of [our] Heavenly Father." This is the high bar of holiness to which our Lord is calling us.

If your lifestyle and your priorities look a little foolish to the world around you, know that you're probably doing it right in God's eyes. At the same time, you will be filled with a peace that the world around you desperately needs. And your stewardship way of life may just draw those around you to the heavenly Father and a life of holiness, too. So, with God's grace and the Holy Spirit dwelling in us, we can confidently press on in the stewardship way of life, aiming to be perfect as our heavenly Father is perfect.
